After this course, you should have a broad overview of the contribution of different philosophers and schools of thought to the history of ideas. You should be able to apply philosophical arguments to ethical, moral, political, social and scientific problems.

- Socrates, Plato and Aristotle
- Philosophy in the Middle Ages
- Rationalism: Descartes, Spinoza, Leibniz
- Empirism: Bacon, Hume
- German idealism: Kant, Hegel
- Nihilism and existentialism: Nietsche, Kierkegaard, Heidegger, Sartre
- Philosophy of logic and language: Wittgenstein
- Postmodernism
